Hello Colt Families -

I hope you find our second issue of *The Quarter Horse* informational and helpful. Happy end of the first quarter, and happy autumn! Every day I am thankful that I am principal of Wooster High School and even more thankful that you have chosen Wooster to be a part of your student's life for the four short years they're here with us.

We're celebrating our 84% graduation rate, an accomplishment made possible by the hard work and dedication of our students, staff, and the systems we have in place to support student learning. In order to continue our focus of increasing graduation rates at Wooster, our goals for the 18-19 school year:

- Increase the percentage of 9th and 10th grade students earning core credit to ensure high school completion.
- Increase student college and career readiness focusing on performance in CCRS: ACT assessment, AP/IB Performance, CTE Pathways, and Dual Credit.

Our commitment at Wooster is – and will continue to be - supporting every child – whether they need credit recovery, tutoring, remediation, or extra support in order to pass EOC, CTE, AP and IB exams.

Our next issue of *The Quarter Horse* will be in mailboxes during the month of February. By the time you receive it, the end of first semester and winter break will be over, and second semester will be started. Upon their return from the winter break, students will be beginning a new semester with new classes and potentially a new schedule. Over winter vacation it may be a good time to talk with your son or daughter about the credits they earned first semester, and set goals for second semester. We will have winter office hours at Wooster. We'll be closed the first two weeks of winter break, and will reopen during the last week of winter break (January 7 through January 11, 2019) for Winter Catch Up Camp.

One last reminder—it you're driving your student to campus, please arrive early and be mindful of the speed limit on campus (10 mph); also please be mindful of our red and yellow zones. For the safety of your student and others, we're asking that you do not idle in red zones to pick up or drop off your student. Instead, use the yellow curb area, or park in a parking spot to unload your student. Thank you for your constant attention to this matter.

Thank you for sharing your child's educational journey with us; thank you for allowing Wooster to be a part of your lives; and thank you for being a part of the Wooster family. Enjoy your fall and winter - keep warm! Go Colts!

FROM YOUR COUNSELING DEPARTMENT

We hope the beginning of the school year has started off well and your students are in the swing of things. Your student's counselor is always available to help out with any questions or concerns you may have. Here is what's happening at grade level:

Ninth Grade- Sheryl Hicks shicks@washoeschools.net

Doing well the first semester of high school is key to a successful high school career. Earning 3.5 credits each semester/7.0 credits for the year equals staying on track towards graduation. Meetings with each 9th grade student will continue throughout the school year to discuss academic progress, attendance, diploma options, and how to get back on track with credits if needed. After School Tutoring and Saturday Academies are available to help students improve their grades.

Career and Technical Education (CTE) is partnering with colleges throughout the state in hopes of creating a more skilled workforce. What does this mean for your student? A new diploma has been announced to the state, called the College and Career Ready (CCR) Diploma. Additionally, for students in a Career and Technical Education program of study are eligible for a Career and Technical Education endorsement, which will allow students to receive free college credit at community colleges throughout Nevada. Both the CCR diploma and CTE endorsement are recognized by industries throughout Nevada to give your student an "edge" when join the Nevada workforce. We encourage you and your student to meet with their counselor to discuss these options in further detail.

A big part of 10th grade and being a part of the Wooster Community is to get involved. Students have been highly encouraged to join a club, sport, or other activity at Wooster. Students can talk to teachers, office staff, and counselors in order to discuss a club/sport/or activity that they might like to join, and to get connected with a coach or advisor.

Eleventh Grade- Casey McCann cmccann@washoeschools.net There will be two important exams for juniors in the next few months. The first one will be the ASVAB, which will take place after Thanksgiving on November 28th. The ASVAB is a multiple-aptitude battery exam that measures developed abilities and helps predict future academic and occupational success in the military. The second important exam for juniors will be the ACT. The ACT is a college entrance exam that covers Reading, Math, Science, and Writing. The ACT is a graduation requirement so every junior must take it in order to graduate next year. The ACT will take place at Wooster High School on March 12, 2019. Wooster will be providing prep classes to help students prepare for the ACT exam. The prep classes will run from January 28th to March 8th at 7:00 am Monday thru Thursday. Course selection is almost here. In January and February students will be selecting their classes for next year. If you want to get a head start and begin looking at course descriptions visit the website and take a look at the course guide. The new course guide will be uploaded over Winter Break.

Attendance is Key!

Students should show up on time every day for school. If a student is absent, they should check in with their teacher the very next day in order to complete missing work and have their absence excused.

Students and parents are encouraged to log in to Infinite Campus (IC) at least one time per week. This will help to address work completion and academic progress. If you do not have an IC login or have forgotten your password, please call the main office at 775-321-3146 and ask for assistance with setting up Infinite Campus.

Students are encouraged to attend after school tutoring and Saturday Academies to take advantage of academic support. See your grade level counselor for details.

Students should complete test retakes. Especially in Math, test retakes are a critical part in maintaining a favorable grade and understanding of the material. Students should talk to their teachers regarding the process and a time to take test retakes.

FROM THE SEL (SOCIAL & EMOTIONAL LEARNING) COMMITTEE

Seminar and SEL

Wooster's Social Emotional Learning (SEL) committee meets weekly to discuss ways that Wooster can continue to enhance SEL for students and faculty on campus. IMPORTANT REMINDERS:

FINALS ARE NOT AVAILABLE BEFORE THE WEEK OF DECEMBER 17TH:

All students taking a course that offers a ½ credit, must take a final exam worth 10-20% of the final grade before they can earn credit. Students who are unable to take the final during December, will be issued a grade of an Incomplete (INC). Students have up to 3 weeks after the start of the 2nd semester to make up missed finals. Student have until Friday, February 1st to make up missed finals, before the grade is changed to an F. Finals will be administered to the student by their teacher during this three-week window. Students must work with teacher to schedule a time to make up the missed final.

MONITORING STUDENT GRADES AND ATTENDANCE ON INFINITE CAMPUS:

Use the Infinite Campus Parent Portal to monitor your child's grades and attendance all semester long. If you're not activated, any attendance secretary in the office can assist you. Parents are notified every time a student is tardy, absent and when teachers input an assignment.

GETTING READY FOR FINAL EXAMS:

Final Exams can count as much as 20% of a student's semester grade. It is very important that your child is prepared for these exams. Tutoring sessions are offered at Wooster on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays in the Career Center from 2:45 – 4:00 PM. Students will have access to computers and teachers who specialize in a variety of subject areas. Saturday Academies are scheduled for December 1st & 15th, from 9am-1pm in the career center to help students finish up last minute assignments and study for finals. Please, encourage your student finish the semester strong by taking advantage of these great resources.

FROM MARLY BARAINCA, CONTINUED

Winter School:

Will be held January 2- January 11, 8:30 – 3:30 pm; plus, an additional 8 hours, time to be determined by the instructor. Winter School is a time for credit recovery. We offer both computer based classes and brick and mortar class (Algebra I, Algebra II, Geometry and English). Your child's counselor will contact you if your child could benefit from a class.

ACT Prep - JUNIORS:

Wooster Intervention will be offering a **6-week ACT prep class**, from January 28^{th} – March 8^{th} before school, twice a week. All juniors are required to take the ACT on March 12. The ACT is a college placement exam, and is used to determining college admissions and scholarship recipients. Please, encourage your junior to take advantage of this opportunity. Next semester, we also have the opportunity to schedule students into a computer based ACT prep class.


FROM DR. GENNY DIERENGA, SCIENCE DEPARTMENT CHAIR

Last month about half of our department had the chance to go to the National Science Teachers Association conference that was held here in Reno. We were inspired with new ideas, new tools and innovative lesson plans. We brought back those ideas to our colleagues and will be implementing them throughout the year.

Our department is committed to hands on and minds on lessons that engage students and ask them to think critically and draw con conclusions. In the picture to the left you will see students building a model of an aquifer. They then

WL/ELL is happy and proud to share a great achievement: Wooster HS came 1st in the whole district with the greatest number of Seals of Bi-literacy earned by our students. Last school year, 84 of our students earned the Seal of Bi-Literacy: 1 in English/Chinese, 75 English/Spanish, 7 in English/ French, and 1 in English/Arabic. We have already successfully run one round of AAPPL tests in October. We will run another one in March 2019. We continue to promote bi-literacy and strive to increase our bi-literate population.

In WL territory, the district decided not to have district finals. Students will however take a district Implemented Performance Assessment (IPA) in February. The evaluation is performance-based and will focus on all 3 modes of communication (interpretive, interpersonal, presentational).

In ELL territory, teachers have received new textbooks for all of our Newcomers in English classes and are working on developing the curriculum.

Also, the new mandatory reporting on Exited EL students (years 1-4) begins this year and will require all teachers who have exited EL students to supply information about students receiving D's and F's to the district for reporting to the State of Nevada.

FROM ERIN ATKINSON, SOCIAL STUDIES DEPARTMENT CHAIR

Social Studies has had a very busy fall! Our government classes just finished their study of the recent mid term election. "We the People" is busy preparing for their district competition on December 15th!

Our own Cindy Griffin recently worked with a nonprofit organization, the Hayek Group, to secure funding for a great new personal finance curriculum for the entire district! Most of our seniors have already piloted the program in their government classes. There has been a lot of positive feedback about the relevance of the material to our students' everyday lives. We thank Cindy for taking the initiative for bringing this program to Wooster and sharing it with Washoe County.

In accordance with Nevada Senate Bill 322, Washoe County will be administering the Civics Exam to seniors this fall. Wooster intends to administer the exam during our senior's government classes the week before final exams. You will see their results marked in Infinite Campus as an academic grade; students must earn a 60% or higher to pass. Passing is now a requirement for all students graduation in Nevada beginning with this year's graduating cohort. The test is 50 questions long- all questions come from the current test given to candidates applying for U.S. citizenship. Your student will be well prepared with material and instruction provided in class. There are several study guides available online to access as well. If your student does not earn a 60% during the fall administration, they will be permitted to retake the test in the spring. Thank you for continuing to support your student!

FROM ROBERT MUNSON, ENGLISH DEPARTMENT CHAIR

The English Department welcomed Reena Spansail in the spring of last year. She is teaching on one of our Freshman Teams, as well as our Spoken Word Poetry elective. Another new Colt is Griffin Peralta who is teaching on another Freshman Team.

In addition to continuing the Spoken Word Poetry elective, we have added another exciting elective—Writing Through Film! This elective is a challenging course designed for juniors and seniors, teaching them how to critically analyze film while honing their writing skills. For students who enjoy film and desire an opportunity to strengthen their critical thinking and writing skills, this elective is for them.

When the new semester begins in January, sophomore English classes will begin discussing the Nevada End of Course Exams that are required by the state. Students will test about half way through the semester in Writing and then complete a Reading portion as their Semester Final Exam. These Exams will comprise 10% of their final grade in the course.

We are headed into the IB student's busiest season!

From November through March, both 11th and 12th grade IB students will be gearing up for fall finals and busy meeting IB Internal Assessment (IA) deadlines in their individual IB classes. Seniors will be uploading final drafts of their Extended Essays and their TOK Prescribed Titles to IB, and finalizing their CAS projects and portfolios. Juniors will be working on their Extended Essays and the stages of the writing process. Lots of students seem to get sick this time of year due to lack of sleep, stress, cold weather and flu season. We want to help support our kids in any way possible, so please seek help if you are struggling in your classes. We have EE workshops, Saturday School, after school tutoring, and intersession. I also have a list of tutors. We know that students need fun too, and a balanced student is a happy student, so please help the students with time management, so that they can explore some fun.

DP Summary Report

Deadline for IB registration has arrived (November 15). All IB 11th & 12th grade students will have been registered. Any student making a change to their IB exam registration at this point will need to pay an amendment fee. Changes included are: addition of a subject, level, or response language, including TOK, or change of EE subject.

Amendment fees go up after each IB deadline.

Amendment fees until January 14 are \$37

Amendment fees after January 14 are \$146

Students can still withdraw from an exam until January 1 and still receive a refund; however, if student was only taking one IB exam, the student will not receive a refund on the IB registration fee.

Paying for an AP or IB exam/or not paying for an exam <u>does not</u> indicate that the student is registered or not registered for that exam. All registrations are done through communication with Mrs. Lienau. All changes (adding an exam, dropping an exam) must go through Mrs. Lienau via an Exam Registration Change Request (a form to be completed and given to Mrs. Lienau).

AP Summary Report

The first deadline for AP exam registration has passed (Nov 1). Any student wishing to take an AP exam will now incur a \$40 late fee (per College Board). See Mrs. Lienau for registration/payment details.

Exam Fees

All fees for AP/IB exams were due by Nov 1. A late fee of \$5 per 30 days will now be assessed for outstanding bills.
